The City of Lloydminster Social Programs and Services department builds connection, resiliency, and capacity for the residents of Lloydminster through preventative programs and community partnerships.

We develop the social fabric of our community through grant funding, direct programming, and a diverse network of relationships with volunteers, service providers, and community members. In 2019, one per cent of municipal tax dollars were allocated toward social programs and services, totalling \$321,742. The department delivered \$1,000,745 in programs, services and grants with support from the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

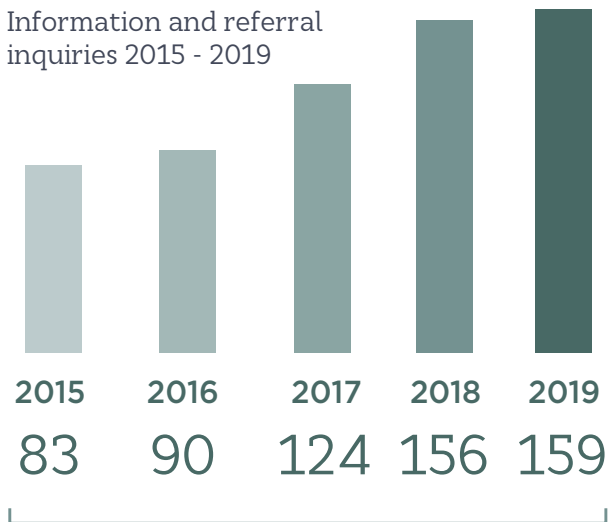
2019 IN REVIEW

INFORMATION & REFERRAL

Community information and referral providers act as intermediates to connect people with resources that can help them. Inquiries are made in person at City Hall, on the phone or via email. The issues, needs, questions and solutions are diverse and may include housing, transportation, employment, mental health, financial aid, senior care, volunteer opportunities and much more.

One of the many tools available to residents is the Lloyd Supports: A Community Services Directory. This information and referral package consists of over 25 categories, linking residents and providers to hundreds of support programs and services.

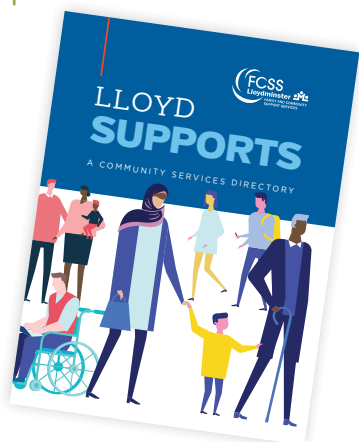


LLOYD SUPPORTS: A COMMUNITY SERVICES DIRECTORY

RECREATION ACCESS PROGRAM

- ✓ An income-based program providing eligible Lloydminster residents access to City of Lloydminster recreation and cultural facilities at a reduced cost. The program was approved by City Council in response to recommendations made in the 2018 Community Social Needs Assessment.

- ✓ 442 Recreation Access Cards were approved

PARTICIPANT USAGE:

- 1,138 drop-ins (462 of these were for children ages 2-17)
- 47 10-ticket passes
- 77 memberships

SURVEY RESULTS:

- 83% of participants indicated they have used recreations facilities more frequently because of the program.

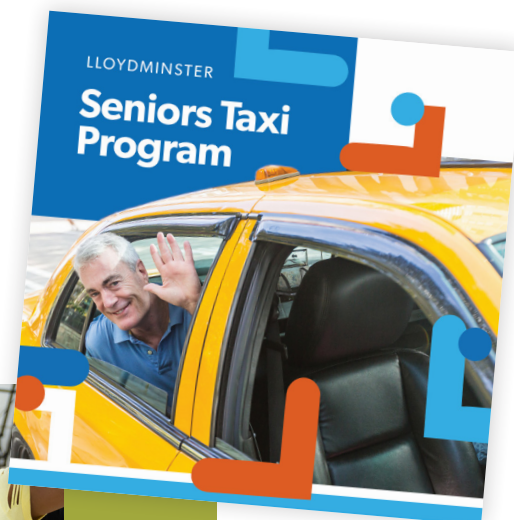
MULTICULTURAL SHOWCASE ON CANADA DAY

- ✓ This partnership program with Catholic Social Services Newcomer Gateway to host a multicultural showcase at Canada Day celebrated its sixth year in 2019.
- ✓ The showcase highlighted the many different cultures that call Canada home. Eleven different food vendors and nearly two dozen entertainment acts celebrated their cultural diversity. Traditional dress, food, music and dancing were celebrated at Lakeland College's gym. China, Pakistan, India, Jamaica and other cultures were represented by Canadians celebrating their heritage.
- ✓ Estimated 1,500 attendees, 160 volunteers.



SENIORS TAXI PROGRAM

- ✓ Transportation support for seniors (65+), allowing them to use one-way taxi vouchers for local travel at \$5/trip. More info available at lloydminster.ca/seniorstaxi.

- ✓ 21,268 vouchers sold.

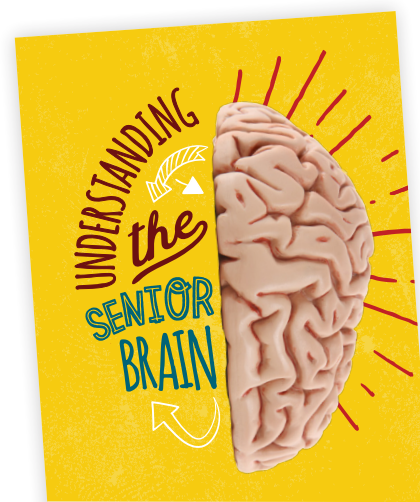


NATIONAL SENIORS DAY

- ✓ National Seniors Day is celebrated on October 1 of each year and is an occasion for Canadians to celebrate seniors' contributions in our homes, communities, and workplaces.
- ✓ Renowned brain health and wellness specialist Gary Anaka presented an energetic and lively session filled with hope and optimism on how the senior brain works. Seniors attending also enjoyed lunch from Haute Cuisine Catering.

YOUTH GRAFFITI CLEANUP

- ✓ In 2016, the Youth Graffiti Cleanup Program started as a partnership between the Lloydminster Community Youth Centre (Lloydminster Interval Home Society), Home Depot and the City of Lloydminster, to support youth in volunteering and make the community a better place. In previous years, the youth cleaned up graffiti along the city's bike trails and fence lines.
- ✓ Mitch LeBlanc, a local artist and co-owner of Art Soul Life Creative Studios, joined the graffiti cleanup team in 2019. LeBlanc donated his time and talents to help create a mural to cover up the graffiti that plagued the decommissioned water treatment plant. Spread over 3 sessions, 12 volunteers dedicated over 130 hours to the project.



ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS WALK

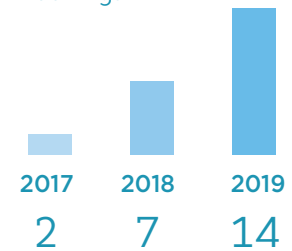
- ✓ The first Elder Abuse Awareness Walk saw 32 participants at Bud Miller All Seasons Park in June 2019. This free for all ages community event was in recognition of World Elder Abuse Day. As education is a big part of preventing elder abuse, information boards about different types of abuse, how to recognize signs of abuse, and where to get help were posted along the walking route.
- ✓ The 17 information boards were recognized during the 2019 Diverse Voices family violence conference in Edmonton in November 2019.



NEIGHBOURHOOD BLOCK PARTY PROGRAM

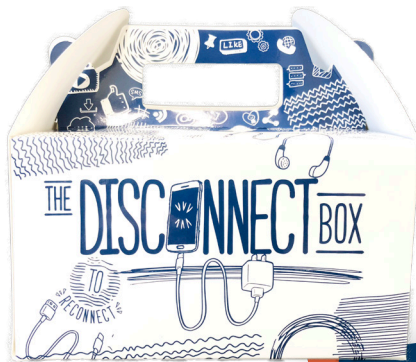
- ✓ The Social Programs and Services department provides tools for residents to host community block parties, including games, sports equipment, assistance with road closures, and limited financial and liability support. In 2019, many Lloydminster residents embraced the benefits of connecting with their neighbours.

DISCONNECT TO CONNECT

- ✓ A reimagining of the previous Family Day Unplugged (2014) campaign was designed to encourage social connection and raise awareness of the impact of “screen time” on youth.
- ✓ The Social Programs and Services department distributed over 500 disconnect boxes and partnered with Lloydminster Public School Division, Lloydminster Catholic School Division and Ahmadiyya Muslim Jama'at to host multiple viewings of the documentary Screenagers. Almost 600 people viewed the documentary.
- ✓ The “Made in Lloydminster” Disconnect to Connect boxes were shared at the 2018 Family and Community Support Services Association of Alberta (FCSSAA) Conference and implemented in 9 other communities across Alberta.



KAIROS BLANKET EXERCISE

- ✓ The City of Lloydminster was proud to host Asokanihkewak (they build bridges) who delivered the KAIROS Blanket Exercise to municipal leaders from Lloydminster and the surrounding area.
- ✓ The exercise is a unique, participatory history lesson – developed in collaboration with Indigenous elders, knowledge keepers and educators – fostering truth, understanding, respect and reconciliation among Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.
- ✓ 15 community leaders participated thanks to the support provided by the Rural Municipalities of Alberta and the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association.



SENIORS WORKSHOPS

- ✓ Welcoming 90 participants in 2019, the Seniors Mental Health First Aid and Elder Abuse – It's Not Right! workshops were offered to seniors and anyone interested by seniors matters.



FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES

A large portion of the Social Programs and Services department's funding comes from the Family and Community Support Services (FCSS). As part of an agreement with the Province of Alberta, the City of Lloydminster receives \$465,585, which matches a minimum contribution of \$116,396 for a total of \$581,981 spent on preventative social programs and services. This 80/20 partnership is calculated based on Lloydminster's Alberta population, but FCSS programs operate freely on both sides of the border. Of this, \$420,000 goes back into the community in the form of grants.





SASKATCHEWAN LOTTERIES COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM

The Saskatchewan Lotteries Community Grant Program is a partnership among Sask. Sport Inc., Sask. Culture Inc., and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association Inc. The grant program assists in developing sport, culture and recreation programs by providing funds to non-profit community organizations operated by volunteers. The City of Lloydminster receives funds that are then distributed to local non-profit volunteer community groups to offer programs. Total grant funding for 2019-2020 was \$81,414. Funds received are calculated based on Lloydminster's Saskatchewan population, but go toward programs that operate on either side of the border.



LLOYDMINSTER TOBACCO REDUCTION GRANT

The Lloydminster Tobacco Reduction Grant was developed to support initiatives that raise awareness of the health risks associated with tobacco and/or support the adoption of a tobacco-free lifestyle. In 2019, \$27,600 was collected from tobacco retailer and flavoured tobacco retailer fees under the Business Licence Bylaw (Bylaw 11-2018). The funds are distributed through the Lloydminster Tobacco Reduction Grant (Policy 15-2017) to community organizations.



SASKATCHEWAN TRANSIT ASSISTANCE FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

The Government of Saskatchewan provides financial support to municipalities who offer paratransit services for persons with disabilities. The City of Lloydminster applies for these funds and gives them to local paratransit operators, i.e. Border City Connects.
