PARTNERSHIPS AND INFORMATION AND REFERRAL

LLOYDMINSTER YOUTH COUNCIL

The City of Lloydminster entered into a formal partnership with the Lloydminster Youth Council in August 2021. The agreement is in effect for three years, with the city providing a yearly budget of \$7,500.00, \$3,000.00 in-kind access to recreation facilities, and 120 hours of administrative support. This partnership aims to build a community of future leaders by facilitating youth involvement within the City of Lloydminster.

211 ALBERTA AND 211 SASKATCHEWAN

211 is an essential service that helps Canadians find the right resource or service for whatever issue they need help with, at the right time. 211 is available 24/7 by phone, text, and chat. The service is free, confidential, and available over the phone in over 170 languages. The Social Programs and Services Department is proud of our partnership with 211 as we serve our residents and the community. City administration audited both 211 databases and provided recommendations on how to streamline data collection and ensure consistency of information. Through this partnership, data is shared across three organizations, and residents have access to the right information at any time.






ANIMATOR PROJECT

The Rural Mental Health Project (RMHP) + Network (RMHN) focuses on building the capacity of rural communities through education, promotion, and prevention activities related to mental health, mental disorders, addiction, and community mental wellness. The Social Programs and Services Team has received training from the RMHP to be community animators. Working with the Lloydminster Public Library (LPL), the team was successful in receiving a Community Grant to support stronger community connections to resources. LPL installed new brochure racks, hosted weekly community outreach dinners, and provided free training to residents, helping to support vulnerable individuals.

INFORMATION AND REFERRAL

Information and referrals connect residents with the available tools and resources in the community. The program aims to reduce barriers to accessing support and services by referring residents to the appropriate agencies. The service can be accessed in person at City Hall, by phone or via email. Inquiries range from simple queries such as recreation subsidy programs to more complex needs such as mental health, financial aid, housing, etc.



YOUTH GRAFFITI CLEANUP

The Youth Graffiti Cleanup is a summer project of the Social Programs and Services Department that facilitates youth volunteering in the community. A graffitied building in Downtown Lloydminster is revitalized through the creation of a mural. The location of this year's mural is the north wall of the Tandoori Tadka restaurant at 4701.50 Avenue B

2023 marks the eighth year of the project and the theme of this year's mural is Pop Art Sunglasses. Sunglasses reflect different perspectives and personalities. It also challenges residents to see beyond their lenses and look at life from another's perspective.

It took four sessions, 18 youth participants and 19 community members to complete the mural. This project would not have been successful without the support of our partners, who either provided the location, food, supplies or volunteers. Special mention to Lloydminster Community Youth Centre, Home Depot Lloydminster, Giant Tiger, Domino's Pizza, Tandoori Tadka, RCMP, the Downtown Area Redevelopment Plan Committee and the City of Lloydminster.



VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION BREAKFAST

With the financial support of Volunteer Alberta, the City of Lloydminster was able to host a Volunteer Appreciation Breakfast and promote volunteering through one utility box wrap. The volunteer breakfast was held at the Lloydminster Golf and Curling Centre on April 22, with a total of 110 attendees from various organizations.

Volunteer Appreciation Week is dedicated to all volunteers who play an important role in making our community a great place to live. Whether an individual volunteers once a week or once a year, this is a way for the city to recognize their impact and contribution.



NEIGHBOURHOOD BLOCK PARTY

The Neighbourhood Block Party encourages residents living on the same street or within an apartment building to create a gathering where they can build relationships and connect over food, fun and play. This program provides organizers with a Block Pary Kit, including free fun games and sporting equipment, financial support to offset the cost of food and street closure assistance, if needed.

In 2023, the department received 22 requests for Neighbourhood Block Party Kits; due to smoke and weather conditions, only 11 block parties were implemented. In 2023, the Neighbourhood Block Party Program was reviewed and decided to prioritize residential bookings. All bookings taking place in 2023, were by residents volunteering to make their neighbourhoods safer and more connected spaces.



NEIGHBOURHOOD CONNECTOR

The Neighbourhood Connector Program recruits volunteers to organize social gatherings and initiatives to improve the overall quality of life in their neighbourhoods. The main goal of this program is to bring neighbours together and reduce isolation by increasing friendships, sharing resources, and creating a sense of community. Five Neighbourhood Connectors were active in 2023, hosting neighbourhood events such as street hockey tournaments and winter celebration events.

INTERSECTORAL ACTION FUND

The City of Lloydminster received \$46,330 from the Intersectoral Action Fund through the Public Health Agency of Canada to complete the Social Needs Assessment and Policy Framework. This included the development of an evaluation structure for the SPF.



CANADA DAY REAFFIRMATION CEREMONY

Forty new and existing citizens residing in Lloydminster signed up to take the Reaffirmation Oath of Citizenship at the Canada Day Celebration. Many Canada Day event attendees also participated in the oath and enjoyed a variety of cultural performances.

MENTAL HEALTH PRESENTATION FOR SCHOOLS

The Community Services Advisory
Committee allocated funds from the Safe
and Healthy Communities Grant to bring
speaker Allan Kehler to present to high
school students. Vic Juba Community
Theatre provided the venue, and
Lloydminster Public School Division and
Lloydminster Catholic School Division
provided bussing to bring students to
the event.

Allan Kehler is a mental health advocate who delivers keynote messages on mental health, resilience and wellness. Allan presented *Transforming Pain into Purpose: Exploring the connection between hope, resilience, and mental health.* Allan shared strategies on how students can identify barriers that prevent them from seeking help, how to support a peer struggling with their mental health and discover how to create an attitude of resilience.

826 Grades 8 and 9 from both school divisions attended Allan's presentation.

LLOYD SUPPORTS: A COMMUNITY SERVICES DIRECTORY

In 1985, City Council redirected Administration to develop a service directory to help connect its residents to information and resources. In 2012, the directory was discontinued and relaunched as the Social Services Roadmap in a pocket-size edition.

A few changes were made to the 2023-2025 edition, which included the introduction of navigation tools, categorization of entries based on the findings of the Social Policy Framework and sectioning of the directory by category. Another exciting news about this edition is the City's partnership with 211 Alberta and 211 Saskatchewan.

SOCIAL POLICY FRAMEWORK

The Social Policy Framework was developed to identify and address community needs. The issues facing our community are complex and require a thoughtful and collaborative approach to be resolved. The Social Policy Framework was developed to create a common understanding of how community, business, and government can address community issues collectively. The Framework provides a common vision, values, and roles that provide everyone with the opportunity to contribute. Seven community priorities serve as a starting point for the SPF:

- Access to Health and Social Services
- Income Inequality
- Transportation
- Safety & Security
- Mental Health
- Recreation
- Housing and Homelessness

COMMUNITY SAFETY AND WELLBEING PLAN

The City of Lloydminster received \$43,000 in grant funding from the Government of Saskatchewan Ministry of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety to create a community safety and well-being plan. The primary objective of this project is to identify non-traditional strategies to reduce negative interactions between authorities and marginalized groups. City administration formed an ad hoc committee, and during the consultation, seven focus groups were identified.

- 1. People with economic disadvantages
- 2. People facing homelessness or housing insecurity
- 3. People with mental health issues and addictions
- 4. Newcomers and Refugees
- 5. Indigenous Peoples
- 6. 2SLGBTQ+IA
- 7. Youths

This project involved discussions with service providers and their clients to get an understanding of the participant's perception of safety, lived experiences, and interactions with authorities. bassa: Social Innovations facilitated in-person interviews from February 5 to 7, 2023. General findings indicate that there are positive relationships between the interviewed stakeholders and authorities.

HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Housing and Homelessness was one of seven community priorities identified in the 2022 Community Social Needs Assessment. In 2023, work began on a Housing Needs Assessment and Strategy. The document is expected to complement the Municipal Development Plan and Social Policy Framework by enabling the City to adapt to future growth with all considerations of the housing continuum in mind. The project will gather data on existing housing needs and develop strategies that the community can use to meet them.

Of note, this project saw Lloydminster's first municipal-led point in time homelessness count. Working with community agencies and service providers, volunteers interviewed individuals to better understand homelessness in Lloydminster. Results will be included in the final report. This project is expected to be completed in early 2024.







FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES*

A large portion of the Social Programs and Services department's funding comes from the Family and Community Support Services (FCSS). As part of an agreement with the Province of Alberta, the City of Lloydminster receives \$481,298.49, which matches a minimum contribution of \$120.324.62 for a total of \$601,623.11 spent on preventative social programs and services. This 80/20 partnership is calculated based on Lloydminster's Alberta population, but FCSS programs operate freely on both sides of the border. Of this. \$385,000 goes back into the community in the form of grants.





SASKATCHEWAN LOTTERIES COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM**

The Saskatchewan Lotteries Community Grant Program is a partnership among Sask. Sport Inc., Sask. Culture Inc., and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation. Association Inc. The grant program assists in developing sport, culture and recreation programs by providing funds to non-profit community organizations operated by volunteers. The City of Lloydminster receives funds that are then distributed to local non-profit volunteer community groups to offer programs. Total grant funding for 2022-2023 was \$84,414. Funds received are calculated based on Lloydminster's Saskatchewan population but go toward programs that operate on either side of the border.



LLOYDMINSTER TOBACCO REDUCTION GRANT*

Council approved the Safe and Healthy Communities Grant Policy No. 551-05 on August 15, 2022. The purpose of this policy is to ensure proper distribution of fees collected pursuant to the sections related to Tobacco Retailer Surcharge and Cannabis Retailer Surcharge in the Business Licensee Bylaw to non-profit organizations and City led initiatives that support education, awareness and cessation of addictive substances. In 2023, \$40,850 in fees were collected and invested in the Safe and Healthy Communities Grant.


